Tucson, AZ (08/30/12) — In an era when public school budgets and curriculum have been drastically cut to make ends meet, charter school systems are often the schools of choice for parents who want *more* for their children. The Arizona charter school system comprised of La Paloma Academy, Heritage Elementary School and Liberty Traditional Charter School remains committed to helping develop a well-rounded, healthy student and community member. In addition to learning about math, science, reading, writing, social studies, and the arts, the students at these charter schools learn about the importance of character traits including trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring, and citizenship.

What do charter schools have to offer?

- Charter schools offer more flexibility and give educators more control over curriculum.
- Parents have an option for where to send children to cultivate their talents and potential.

"The bottom line is, when we as educators take time to look beyond the test and keep our eye on the bigger picture – our role in helping to shape and successfully send out into the world multifaceted individuals and contributing community members – we can continue to deliver unique learning opportunities to our students that encourage a healthy mind, body and character," said Superintendent Raena Janes, who was recently profiled in a Family Circle magazine article, "A School That's More Than Academics."

Janes has been an active advocate for Arizona education – and choice in education – for many years, striving to build a solid foundation for every child. She serves as superintendent of three separate charter schools with seven campuses across Arizona: La Paloma Academy, with three campuses in Tucson; Heritage Elementary School, with campuses in Glendale and Williams; and Liberty Traditional Charter School, with campuses in Phoenix and Douglas. Janes received the 2011 Phoenix Business Journal's 40 Under 40 Award and the 2006 Tucson 40 Under 40 Award, and was named the 2008 Tucson 40 Under 40 Mentor of the Year. Her efforts to turn students

into well-educated, productive citizens of Arizona were recognized at the state level, when she was presented with the State's Excellence in Education Award.

The Arizona State Legislature allowed for charter schools as state-funded public schools in 1994, saying parents should have more freedom to make academic choices for their children's education. Charter schools are contracted to provide tuition-free educational services. Among the legislated requirements, charter schools must adhere to state education standards, including AIMS testing, and follow state budgeting requirements. The largest and fastest-growing of the schools in Janes' charter school system, La Paloma Academy has experienced unprecedented growth since its inception in 2002, opening a second campus in Tucson in 2006 and a third in 2012. La Paloma Academy is now a top Tucson public school and home to more than 1,480 students across the three campuses.

"In addition to focusing on academics and character building, each of our charter schools incorporates community service into the curriculum," Janes said. "Students at our schools learn about and contribute to their community through projects including cleaning up the local environment, contributing to seasonal charity drives, and celebrating local military heroes. The projects are all part of our mission to create not only well-educated students, but well-rounded citizens and members of the community."
